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Communities In Schools Partners with Walmart for Back to School Drive

CIS partners with local school districts and community organizations to connect resources and services to kids at-risk of dropping out and their families. ICF International conducted a five-year evaluation and compared results to over 1,600 studies screened by the Department of Education's What Works Clearinghouse. The evaluation shows that the CIS model is one of a very few organizations proven to keep students in school and the only one to document that it both increases graduation rates and decreases dropout rates. In Georgia, 39 CIS local affiliates provide services through the CIS model to more than 124,000 students in hundreds of school and community-based sites. Key initiatives include mentoring, tutoring, parent engagement, literacy, after-school programs, youth leadership, and Performance Learning Centers[®]. PLCs provide another learning option for high school students who are not succeeding in the traditional school setting. Communities with CIS programs have seen an increase in their high school graduation rates, a decrease in violence and disruptions, and an increase in attendance and academic achievement.
